Jerry Smoler Was Greeted By The Community

About a hundred Monmouth residents turned out last night, at Meling's restaurant, to extend greetings to Smoler Bros., now operating in the former Form-Rogers plant, 1201 North Main street, and in turn they heard Jerry Smoler, the firm's president, say some kind things about Monmouth, the people in it, and the people who are working for the company.

As a further gesture, he announced that the Smoler company beginning in 1971, will contribute \$5,000 a year, to be used for the benefit of the Monmouth community.

The money will be distributed among philanthropic causes, and will be administered by a committee yet to be named, it was announced. Mr. Smoler suggested that some of it could go to the Warren Achievement School, and the Achievement Industries, which he had seen earlier in the day.

Robert Shunick, executive vice president of the Monmouth Area Chamber of Commerce, presided at the dinner meeting last night, and Mayor George Bersted and David Hallam spoke briefly, as did Ray Green, chairman of the industrial committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Smoler then spoke briefly and disclosed that the Smoler Bros. volume topped \$37,000,000 during the past year, with much of the production in plants in smaller cities comparable in size to Monmouth.

It was a long day for Mr. Smoler and his party who came down from Chicago for the "greeting party". Explains Change In The Law On Theft

Under the revised criminal code, a man doesn't have to go into a store to commit a theft. This came to light when a request was made for clarification of a story saying that Larry Lucas had been put on probation for theft stemmed from a theft at the Torley hardware store on August 16 1968. However, it was Lucas' contention that he had received the stuff, stolen at the Torley store, in payment of a debt.

Larry Spears, state's attorney, explained that anyone obtaining control over stolen property, who could reasonably believe the property to have been stolen, thereby intending to deprive the owner of the property, is guilty of theft. It was under this provision that he was found guilty, it was explained.

conducted tour of Monmouth that took them to the Warren Achievement School, the Achievement Industries; Monmouth college, and a visit to the new library and finally to the Community Memorial Hospital.

After the tour, Mr. Smoler and the group gathered in the Festival room at Meiling's restaurant to talk to newsmen about the company, about the plant here, and what they had in mind for it.

Some of the "background" was filled in by Sol Greensweig, who was best known to the local men because of his frequent visits to Monmouth last fall, during the winter, and this spring.

He recalled that the Smoler firm had learned that Formfit - Rodgers might consider making the plant at Monmouth available, and he came down without prior announcement on September 10, and returned in October.

Because of changed conditions, the Formfit - Rogers line was in lowered production, while the Smoler firm's "fashion line" was expanding and more production facilities could be used. It was agreed that the plant here, the availability of skilled help, that could be re-trained for the different type of work, would offer advantages.

Before making the decision, however, the Smoler firm made a study of the community and concluded that Monmouth was the sort of place it would like to be associated with.

Asked about the origin of the Smoler Bros. company, Jerry Smoler told a fascinating story of a family's success in a new land. Maurice Smoler, his father, came to this country from Russia (the family name in Russian means wagon maker) and he found a job with the famed men's tailoring firm of Hart Shaffner and Marx, Chicago, and presently became a foreman.

It wasn't long, however, before he decided to go into business for himself, and started in 1911 in his own home, but he soon was expanding into a loft about the time of World War I, and had further growth in the years after that. The present corporate name dates from August 13, 1938, he recalled.
