'Smoler Day' Noted

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Smoler described his firm as the second largest supplier in the nation of women's fashions for mail order firms.

When asked why the local dress factory has not reached peak employment as soon as had been expected, Smoler cited two reasons: "The truck strike which made it difficult for them to get material, and the controversy in the fashion industry concerning the length of skirts this fall."

 Smoler discussed the factors that contribute to fashion trends and indicated that it was his opinion that the mid-length would be more favorably accepted than the maxi-length but he did not rule out continued popularity for the mini-length.

Smoler said he had been favorably impressed by the progress made by the employees at the Monmouth plant and stated that he expected it to be one of their most successful operations.

Compliments City
 Smoler closed the press conference by commenting on impressions gained during his tour Thursday. He described the Community Memorial Hospital as most unusual and said, "As we have operations in 10 communities of approximately the same size as Monmouth, we are familiar with such towns and in no other community have we found such excellence of concern for the welfare of its citizens, including the unfortunate."

Smoler Day concluded with a dinner at Meling's Restaurant at which members of the Monmouth Area Chamber of Commerce and their spouses paid further tribute to the representatives of the Smoler firm.

Summer Classes To Begin

MONMOUTH — Dr. Garvin Davenport, director of the Monmouth College summer session, has announced that registration for the 1970 session will begin at 1 p.m. on June 15, and will continue until 4:30 that same day. All classes will begin Tuesday, June 16, and will continue to July 24, the final day of the summer session.

This summer there will be fifty courses offered in all disciplines; art, biology, education, English, government, classics, economics, history, mathematics, modern language, physics, religion, speech, sociology, psychology, and physical education. Independent study will be available in a number of departments as well.

More than thirty members of the regular Monmouth College faculty will be on campus to teach in the summer session.

Two special programs are also being offered this summer in addition to the regular programs and those offered through the Associated Colleges of the Midwest (ACM).

The special programs are the Young Presidents' Organization (YPO) business internship seminar, directed by the Department of Economics, and a Spanish and Mexican culture program which has been arranged with the University of the Americas at Puebla, Mexico. This program will be directed through the Monmouth College Department of Modern Languages.
